(C) Regarding M.Pharm Course

Regulation-23.(1) of the “The Master of Pharmacy (M.Pharm) Course Regulations, 2014” mandates that the ratio of recognized Postgraduate teacher to number of students to be admitted for the Postgraduate degree course shall be 1:3 to the extent that in no circumstances more than 15 students for Postgraduate degree shall be registered in a department / specialization in one academic year.
- ii. The Regulation-9. of the said Regulations prescribes the nomenclature of Postgraduate pharmacy courses which shall be as prescribed under Appendix-A to these Regulations.
- iii. As per regulation 20.1(b) of the Masters of Pharmacy (M.Pharm) Course Regulations, 2014, only those teachers who possess at least five years teaching experience after passing M.Pharm/Pharm.D course or three years teaching experience after Ph.D shall be recognized by the Pharmacy Council India as post graduate pharmacy teachers.
